President and Executive Director

The theme of last year's convention '*See, I Am Doing a New Thing - Creative, Collaborative Leadership*' has given direction for the Catholic Health Association of Saskatchewan to be daring to risk something new for Catholic health care in Saskatchewan.

Change is very hard but necessary so that the unmet needs in Catholic health care are responded to with innovative methods to ensure that the Mission, Vision and Values remain deeply rooted in Gospel Values and that the needs of the sick, suffering, marginalized and dying are being met with compassion, care and commitment.

Joint Board Committee

During the last year the members of the Joint Board Committee of the Saskatchewan Catholic Health Corporation and the Catholic Health Association of Saskatchewan met four times to articulate a shared vision for the collaborative work of both organizations and to make recommendations to the respective boards.

In open and frank discussions, the committee members identified that there was a need to become a 'blended' Catholic health care organization. The reasons being:

- There is persistent confusion amongst both organizations, the public, government officials and Board members as to the roles and responsibilities of each organization
- The lack of financial resources of each organization to support the operating expenses and salaries of the Mission Integration Director and Ethicist
- The urgency to speak with one voice, through one organization, that represents all facets of Catholic health care in Saskatchewan
- The resignation of the two organization's leaders to take effect by the end of 2007

A recommendation was then presented at respective SCHC/CHAS Board meetings in May and June 2007 in the form of motions.

SCHC's motion: "that the mandate of the Joint Board Committee be expanded to study possible options in relation to the 'blending' of these organizations in order to propose a model which would best serve the Catholic health care ministry in Saskatchewan."

CHAS's motion: "that without presuming that we are going to become one organization, that we expand the purpose of the Joint Board Committee to look at the 'blending' of the two organizations in order to propose a model which would best serve the needs of the Catholic health care ministry in Saskatchewan."

As a follow up recommendation from both boards to pursue the next step, Monica Beavis, SCHC President/CEO and CHAS Executive Director, Sister Jo-Ann Duggan scheduled a September 2007 meeting with the Joint Board Committee to discuss a plan of action towards 'blending'.

In 2006-07 the following Joint Board Committee initiatives occurred:

- Sr. Jo-Ann Duggan & Monica Beavis met with the Saskatoon Diocesan Catholic Institutions Group to address the urgency for Catholic leadership formation and succession planning in Catholic health care and education. An outcome from these discussions was a forum to bring Catholic institutions and stakeholders together to reflect on the issues and challenges facing Catholic identity and how together to strengthen the Catholic identify. The Catholic Connections Committee was struck and planning is underway to host a province-wide forum for Catholic decision makers on October 12 & 13, 2007. A follow-up report will be forwarded to the organizations represented at the forum.
- A Joint Board education project with Fr. Mark Miller, Monica Beavis and Sr. Jo-Ann Duggan was initiated and brought to three member facilities in Ponteix, Gravelbourg and Macklin to clarify the Mission roles of the two Catholic organizations to the front line staff, board members and, in Gravelbourg, the parish. The topics were on Mission, Ethics, and Spirituality within Catholic health care. These events drew very positive feedback from the participants.
- SCHC struck a Strategic Relations Committee to develop a strategy for the member facilities to identify issues relating to governance and policies that should be discussed at the Provincial government level. Marty Schneider, CHAS President, is a standing member of the committee. The committee met in December 2006.
- In September 2006, SCHC hired a part-time Mission Integration Director to service the nine sponsored facilities. CHAS committed to collaborate and support the roles and responsibilities of the Director to enhance and ensure the Mission of Catholic health care in the facilities. Unfortunately the Mission Integration Director resigned in January 2007 and the position remains open.
- SCHC identified the financial need for a private fundraising campaign to help to fund Catholic health care ministry into the future. CHAS proposed that fundraising for an ethicist be added to the present Corporation priorities in a joint CHAS/SCHC fundraising initiative. Bert Yakichuk, CHAS Board member, is a standing member of the SCHC Revenue Development Committee.

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- SCHC established an Advocacy and Communications Committee to deal with, among other things, issues where Catholic health care or its member facilities need to get the ear of politicians or regional authorities. CHAS supports this role through its traditional method of learning about issues from member organizations. These issues are brought to the Joint Board Committee and/or the SCHC Advocacy and Communications Committee. Chris Boychuk, a CHAS Board member, is a standing member of the SCHC Advocacy and Communications Committee.

During the St. Elizabeth's Hospital of Humboldt tubal ligation issue, SCHC kept CHAS informed of the meetings, negotiations and outcome of the hospital's journey, which led to the decision of transfer to the Saskatoon Health Region. Fr. Mark Miller kept the Executive and CHAS Board members informed of the occurrences around the situation at St. Elizabeth's Hospital.

Ethics Resource Services

The Executive Committee was mandated to ensure the recruitment of a second ethicist position and to develop a financial plan to support this purpose. An informal preliminary financial planning meeting was held to discuss the pros and cons to raise funds for an ethicist position. Over the 2006 summer months a Development Officer was pursued to submit a proposal to fundraise for an Endowment Fund to support an ethicist. By late October 2006, that person was no longer available for this position. After revisiting this fundraising initiative, the CHAS Board agreed to make a written request to SCHC to propose that fundraising for an ethicist be added to the present SCHC priorities in a joint CHAS/SCHC fundraising initiative. CHAS would be prepared to support the fundraising effort with monies from the CHAS Ethics Fund up to a maximum of \$25,000. An Ethics Resource Services Financial Plan was presented at the March 2007 SCHC Board Meeting and forwarded to the SCHC Revenue Development Committee for review. By June 2007, the Revenue Development Committee was in the process of engaging the assistance of a professional fundraiser.

At the June 2007 Ethics Committee meeting, Brenda FitzGerald announced that St. Paul's Hospital would be hiring a full-time ethicist and invited a member of CHAS to be a part of the Search Committee. (Fr. Mark Miller was approached, and agreed to be on this search committee.) CHAS would pay a portion of the salary. This would enable the ethicist to continue to be available to member facilities throughout Saskatchewan. Contracts with other health regions might be required to defray some of the costs. St. Paul's Hospital's commitment would also allow for office and administration costs to be covered within the hospital itself.

CHAS will continue to take some responsibility for raising funds to partially support a Catholic ethicist for the province of Saskatchewan.

Financial Proposal

During these last few years, the CHAS office personnel identified that the AccPac accounting system was too sophisticated for a non-profit organization such as CHAS. Acting on the approval of the Board, Trish Holst, Administrative Assistant, presented a proposal for changing the office accounting system from AccPac to 'Simply Accounting'. Trish pursued training sessions and is now setting up the new system to run in the 2007-08 fiscal year. Thanks to Trish for identifying the cost savings and efficiency of this new accounting system.

In accord with her communication strategies of 2006-07 Sandra Kary has presented a number of communication tools to ensure that the Mission of CHAS is being visibly promoted and understood in our communities. Congratulations Sandra on the use of such creative talent to ensure the Mission of CHAS is viable and visible.

CHAS is forever grateful for the financial support from Government, the Bishop's pledge and the Membership to ensure the financial operation of CHAS. We recognize that these are difficult financial times. CHAS is grateful for the ongoing funding support in these last 64 years and for each year in the future.

CHAS Board of Directors & Staff

In April 2007, Brenda Fitzgerald submitted her letter of resignation as Secretary Treasurer of the Board; Julie Hodgson also resigned as a Board Member. Bert Yakichuk was appointed Interim Secretary Treasurer, as well as Chair of the Ethics Committee and Fenton Yeo was invited to fill the unexpired term of Julie Hodgson. A debt of gratitude is owed to Bert and Fenton for responding to these requests.

The CHAS Board met in three member institutions during this past year: St. Paul's Hospital, Saskatoon; St. Joseph's Hospital/ Foyer d'Youville, Gravelbourg and St. Joseph's Health Centre in Macklin. The February 2007 Board meeting scheduled for Santa Maria in Regina was cancelled due to Sr. Jo-Ann's mother's death and inclement traveling conditions. During the tours of the facilities, the Board and Staff felt humbled and honored to walk in the footsteps of the founders of these caring facilities. The Mission of hospitality and the commitment of caring was very evident in our visits. Thank you to the member facilities for hosting CHAS and for your commitment in continuing to promote the Mission of Catholic health care in each of your facilities.

In April 2007, the Board and staff went on retreat to recommit their hopes and vision to answer God's call to serve the unmet needs of the Church's ministry of health care. Sandra, Sr. Jo-Ann & Fr. Mark facilitated this visioning commitment retreat process held at the Heritage Place Bed & Breakfast, Gravelbourg .

In October 2006, Trish Holst was hired as part-time Administrative Assistant to succeed Marilyn Ellis. Marilyn truly was an ambassador and gave 12 years of dedicated and committed work to CHAS. Thank you Marilyn. Sandra Kary continued as part-time Communications Assistant until a staffing review occurred and job titles, roles and responsibilities changed in January 2007. Trish, Administrative Assistant, works three days a week and Sandra, Executive Assistant, works four days a week.

At the June 2007 CHAS Board meeting, Sr. Jo-Ann Duggan, Executive Director, submitted a formal letter of resignation effective November 30, 2007. The CHAS Executive was then mandated to do an internal evaluation as how to proceed in light of the changes in Catholic health care. At the May 2007 SCHC Board meeting Monica Beavis submitted her letter of resignation as President and CEO of SCHC effective December 31, 2007. The opportunity to address 'blending' became more urgent as both positions would be reviewed towards strategic planning for the future.

For the June 2007 Board meeting, Reverend Bob Williston of the Redemptorist Mission Team, submitted a letter of offer to CHAS to contract his part-time services in 2007-08 to continue to promote the ministry of Catholic health care in parishes and facilities. The Board confirmed this great opportunity to engage Bob during this time of transition. Bob will be contracted for part-time services to support, promote and educate the Mission of Catholic health care ministry. Bob will work, in collaboration with the SCHC Mission Integration Director, in the parishes and facilities.

In these changing times and having experienced CHAC's project charters in the last two years, the staff reviewed the CHAS committee structures and terms of reference and the challenges that the staff incur in order to conduct meetings with a limited budget and personnel. A motion was proposed to change the bylaw to encompass project charters. Project charters will be an efficient way to ensure the ministry direction objectives are completed.

Catholic health care in Saskatchewan, throughout the other provinces of Canada, and in the United States has to be very vigilant to ensure that the ministry continues to grow stronger and more viable in both parishes and health care facilities. To reiterate a quote from the Pastoral Letter of the Canadian Conference of Catholic Bishops "Our voice, our presence, our excellence and faith-driven leadership are all crucial at this critical juncture."

What then must we do to create something new to ensure that the Mission lives on? This year's convention theme is so encouraging " *A Legacy of Hope: Gifts Exchanged at the End of Life*"; what are the gifts of hope that we as two Catholic health organizations in Saskatchewan can bring to the 21st Century?

In this last year CHAS has taken a leap in faith to be creative, collaborative and committed in engaging faith communities to become more aware and proactive in the healing ministry of Jesus.

Thank you to the CHAS Board of Directors, the Executive, the Staff, the Bishops of Saskatchewan, the Saskatchewan Catholic Health Corporation, the Catholic Health Association of Canada, the Associate, Affiliate, Honorary and Personal Membership and friends of CHAS for your commitment in being carriers of hope for the vision of Catholic health care in the 21st Century in Saskatchewan.

In closing, **a personal word from the President/Board Chair:** "During my working career, decision-making was a responsibility and an obligation that fell on my plate. During this past year as your President/Board Chair, many decisions have been made that will impact and leave a defining mark on the future of Catholic Health care ministry in Saskatchewan. I believe that history will show that those decisions were made in the best interests of defining the delivery of this ministry into the future.

A debt of gratitude is owed to our very dedicated Board of Directors and staff who contribute their time and talents in looking so judiciously after the affairs of CHAS. My personal thanks are extended to all of you as I move on to Past-President of the Association.

Allow me however to more particularly single out Sr. Jo-Ann Duggan who is leaving us as Executive Director after 4 years at the helm. In her own words - 'it has been quite a steep learning curve' and that she is truly grateful to have had the opportunity to serve in the ministry of Catholic health care in Saskatchewan.' My observations have been that she has mastered the challenge well and has given CHAS her complete effort and dedication. Sr. Jo-Ann, on behalf of the Board, staff and myself, I wish you the very best in the path that the future takes you".

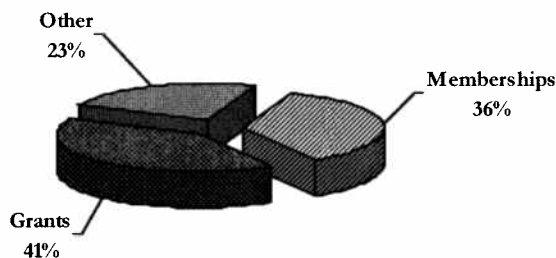
Secretary-Treasurer's Report

The Catholic Health Association of Saskatchewan is pleased to report a successful year of service to its stakeholders, the members, and the community it serves.

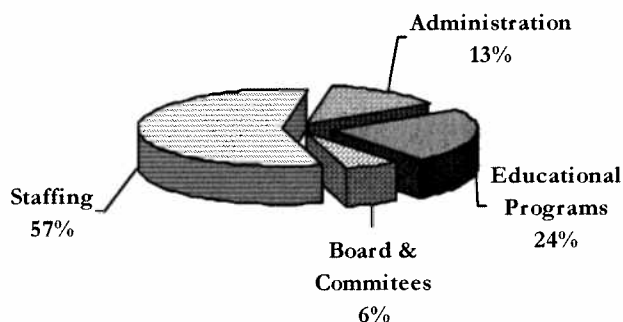
The revenues for the year amount to \$257,552. Membership fees account for 36% of the operating funds. We continue to appreciate the financial support through grants from the Saskatchewan Bishops and the Province of Saskatchewan (41%). The remaining operating funds (23%) are derived from the services provided and the generous donations from CHAS members and sponsor groups for our annual convention.

Revenues



The expenditures for the year amount to \$244,372 resulting in a profit of \$13,180. Staffing accounts for 57%; Educational Programs 24%; Administration 13%; and Board and Committee functioning 6%.

Expenditures



In recent years, the Association has operated on a Board approved deficit, drawing down on reserve funds. This year, resulted in a small profit, even though the budget had provided for a possible deficit of as high as \$16,083. The 2007-08 preliminary budget again provides for a possible deficit of \$13,113.

Hon. Emmett Hall Education Fund

Activity within this fund is comprised of interest earnings of \$1,918, and donations of \$400, leaving a fund balance of \$52,394. This fund is used to pay for specific education projects.

Moola Freer Scholarship Fund

This fund is dedicated to Palliative Care Education and the annual Palliative Care Award for excellence in Palliative Care in Saskatchewan. It stands at \$53,669.

Ethics Fund

The proceeds in this fund are derived from donations and the sale of Advance Care Directive Booklets. It is focused on ethics education and furthering ethics resource services in the province. This fund stands at \$25,634.

I would like to extend my sincere appreciation to the entire staff for the excellent stewardship of resources over the past year. In particular, I would like to recognize and thank the new addition to the CHAS staff who has had a major role in preparing the financial statements - Welcome Trish Holst! Trish has done an outstanding job of updating and maintaining the books and records of the association in addition to streamlining our computer operations. I have relied on her extensively and she has always come through with efficiency and accuracy.

*It should be noted that during the 2006 - 07 year, Brenda FitzGerald resigned as Secretary-Treasurer of CHAS. Bert Yakichuk accepted this role to complete the term.



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AUDITORS' REPORT TO THE MEMBERS

We have audited the statement of financial position of Catholic Health Association of Saskatchewan as at June 30, 2007 and the statements of revenue and expenses and operating fund balance, restricted funds and cash flows for the year then ended. These financial statements are the responsibility of the Association's management. Our responsibility is to express an opinion on these financial statements based on our audit.

Except as explained in the following paragraph, we conducted our audit in accordance with Canadian generally accepted auditing standards. Those standards require that we plan and perform an audit to obtain reasonable assurance whether the financial statements are free of material misstatement. An audit includes examining, on a test basis evidence supporting the amounts and disclosures in the financial statements. An audit also includes assessing the accounting principles used and significant estimates made by management, as well as evaluating the overall financial statement presentation.

In common with many charitable organizations, the Association derives revenue from the annual convention and education programs the completeness of which is not susceptible to satisfactory audit verification. Accordingly, our verification of these revenues was limited to the amounts recorded in the records of the Association and we were not able to determine whether any adjustments might be necessary to revenue, excess (deficiency) of revenue over expenses, assets and operating fund balances.

In our opinion, except for the effect of adjustments, if any, which we might have determined to be necessary had we been able to satisfy ourselves concerning the completeness of the revenues referred to in the preceding paragraph, these financial statements present fairly, in all material respects, the financial position of the Association as at June 30, 2007 and the results of its operations and its cash flows for the year then ended in accordance with Canadian generally accepted accounting principles.

Notes to Financial Statements

Year ended June 30, 2007

1. Significant accounting policies:

(a) Fund accounting:

The Association follows the restricted fund method of accounting. The operating fund accounts for the Association's programs and administration. Restricted funds have been established for certain designated programs as follows:

Hon. Emmett M. Hall Fund:

The Hon. Emmett M. Hall fund was established for specific education projects in honour of the late Hon. Emmett M. Hall. The fund balance consists of an appropriation of surplus plus specific donations and interest earned on the fund balance less specific expenses.

Moola Freer Scholarship Fund:

The Moola Freer Scholarship Fund was established for Palliative Care education and awards by Dr. Dawood and Anne Moola. The fund consists of specific donations and interest earned on the fund balance less specific expenses.

Ethics Fund:

The Ethics Fund was established for the purpose of identifying funds connected specifically with the promotion and sale of Advance Care Directive booklets and videos. The fund consists of specific donations, income from sales less specific expenses with any surplus funds designated for ethics seminars and to explore the development of an ethics resources centre.

(b) Equipment and automobile:

Amortization on equipment and automobile is provided on the straight line basis, over the estimated useful lives of the assets as follows:

(c) Revenue recognition:

Grant and memberships are recognized as revenue on a calendar year basis. Other revenue is recognized when it becomes receivable.

1. Significant accounting policies (continued):

(d) Financial instruments:

The carrying amounts of the Association's financial instruments including cash, accounts receivable and accounts payable, approximate fair value due to the short term maturity of these items. Cost of investments plus accrued interest approximates market value.

(e) Use of estimates:

The preparation of financial statements in conformity with Canadian generally accepted accounting principles requires management to make estimates and assumptions that affect the reported amounts of assets and liabilities and disclosure of contingent assets and liabilities at the date of the financial statements and the reported amount of revenue and expenses during the reporting period. Actual results could differ from these estimates.

2. Investments:

Investments are held in term deposits and government bonds and are recorded at cost with accrued interest of \$32,005 (2006 - \$18,650) included in accounts receivable. The market value of investments at June 30, 2007 including accrued interest, was \$415,826 (2006 - \$401,514).

Ethics workshops and consultations continue to be provided within the province by Fr. Mark Miller, CHAS Ethicist. In the 2006 - 07 year Fr. Mark worked with the ethics committees of St. Elizabeth's Hospital in Humboldt, Mont St. Joseph's in Prince Albert as well as St. Paul's Hospital in Saskatoon. Workshops were provided on end-of-life care in Moose Jaw (for the Health Region, but with good attendance from Providence Place). A series of ethics talks at St. Joseph's Hospital in Estevan and then, in conjunction with the St. Joseph's ethics committee, for the Sun Country Regional Ethics Committee were given. Presentations supporting Catholic health care in St. Joseph's Hospital, Gravelbourg and St. Joseph's Nursing Home in Ponteix were well received. The Nipawin Deanery of the Prince Albert Diocese extended an invitation to Fr. Mark to further the mission of Catholic health care ministry in the parishes.

Fr. Mark Miller has informed CHAS of his departure in the summer of 2008; at that time, he will be assuming other responsibilities within the Redemptorist Community. This will result in the need for CHAS to have access to the services of an ethicist. CHAS is working in cooperation with all our partners to fill the Catholic Ethicist position upon his departure. Discussions regarding a replacement and cost-sharing are on-going with the various stakeholders. Further direction and decision-making on this matter is the work of the CHAS Executive rather than the Ethics Committee.

There has been an initiative and motion put in place from this committee to develop recorded teaching sessions from Fr. Mark Miller. His expertise and influence in our province has been significant; having his core training sessions recorded to DVD would give CHAS an excellent resource to offer to facilities and parishes around the province and throughout Canada. It was suggested that this initiative become a Project Charter of CHAS.

No other ethical concerns have arisen this year requiring the work of this committee.

*It should be noted that during the 2006 - 07 year, Brenda FitzGerald resigned as Chair of this committee; Bert Yakichuk, Vice-Chair, accepted the lead role of Chair to fill this position.

The Issues Advisory Committee reports to the Board of Directors and is responsible for monitoring political, administrative and legislative issues in the health care system that could impact the Mission of Catholic Health Care in Saskatchewan.

During the 2006 - 07 year, there were no significant issues that required this committee to meet.

In March 2007, the Advocacy and Communications Committee of the Saskatchewan Catholic Health Corporation invited a CHAS representative to sit on this committee. Sharing similar interest and mandate, Chris Boychuk, as Chair of the Issues Advisory Committee, accepted this invitation at the April 2007 CHAS Board Meeting.

As a follow-up to an initiative that began with the Issues Advisory Committee, the Saskatchewan Spiritual Care Coalition was successful in birthing a formal association called the Saskatchewan Association of Spiritual Care Practitioners in Healthcare (SASCPH).

Having representation on this Coalition Steering Committee, CHAS attended and contributed to seven meetings held throughout the year in preparation for their Inaugural Meeting. A final Spiritual Care Development Work Day was also planned, and successfully attended on September 25, 2006 at St. Martin's United Church.

The Coalition and committed Spiritual Care Workers from across the province should be commended for their tireless work in garnering the support of many faith-based organizations for their cause. Their work in developing a constitution, code of ethics and standards of practice is a significant foundation piece to their formal Inaugural Meeting that occurred on April 16, 2007. Meeting with the Provincial government and opposition parties is part of their 'next steps' strategy.

CHAS has committed \$1000 towards in-kind services to the SASCPH to give support and clerical services in their first year of development. We wish them all the best as they follow their vision of providing professional spiritual care, available to those of all faiths, as an integrated discipline in the health care system.

I am pleased to report that the Membership committee met two times during the year, on January 25 and June 4, 2007.

On each occasion, we observed that; (1) it is becoming more difficult to attract members to the committee. We question whether the committee structure is working and worth the expense for the Association; (2) it is difficult to attract new members to the Association. Our membership, Associates in particular, are becoming more difficult to retain; (3) we should continue to pursue the strategic plan we developed last year; that is, include a communications and "Why be a Member of CHAS" initiative along with our membership recruitment and retention efforts.

Our efforts did achieve some success. In 2007, a *White Mass* will be celebrated in the Saskatoon, Prince Albert and Regina Dioceses. (It is called a White Mass because traditionally, health care workers wore white attire. Liturgically, white symbolizes hope and comfort to the sick and suffering). Through the celebration of the liturgy we hope to bring together health care providers and the community in recognition of a common ministry of Jesus in health and healing. We urge everyone to support this initiative by attending one of these Masses.

Some increased work with parishes was started. We note that only 15 parishes in the province are Associate members; it is our desire that most parishes would support our Association. Our faith communities must be aware of, and support, the Church's active involvement in the public health system. Values count. The ongoing involvement of vibrant faith-based health care will help ensure consideration of the primacy of the human person in public health delivery decisions. Information and awareness sessions were held in the Prince Albert Diocese, especially in the parishes of the Nipawin Deanery, and, in Regina, where John and Florence Hoffort train volunteers for the Parish Home Ministry of Care.

We ask that all members be engaged in their home parishes to promote the importance of belonging to the Association. As we move forward on this initiative, we are concerned that our 'Associate' membership category may diminish as smaller parishes, Knights of Columbus and Catholic Women's League councils experience difficulty in paying the established fees.

Among our targeted audiences for interest in membership is our Catholic school system. However, we have not yet developed a strategy to engage our young adults. As they grow and mature in awareness of their baptismal vocation of ministry, we believe that the Association should take steps to interest our youth in Catholic health leadership opportunities.

Respecting a more effective communication strategy, the Association has redesigned its brochure highlighting the work of the Association, the value of Catholic health care, and addressing the general faith community for interest in membership. A new banner was developed to replace the old display booth, and an electronic newsletter titled *Moments and Memos* is being developed for e-mail. This piece brings bite-sized encouragement and CHAS news to its members. The web-site is presently hosted by the CHAC; a new design and format is required to bring it up to date.

On behalf of the committee, I wish to acknowledge the excellent work of our staff in getting these initiatives implemented. I wish to thank the members for their ongoing support of the Association, and I encourage everyone to consider membership recruitment as one of their duties and privileges of the Association.

The January 2007 meeting hosted Steve Hill, Director of Mission with the Alberta Catholic Health Corporation, as a guest in preparation of the 2007 CHAS Mission Week held from April 23 - 27.

As guest facilitator on the CHAS team, the theme *Compassion: A Calling For Caregivers* was brought to life. Steve used an interactive drama on the Good Samaritan, a teaching time on the legacy of the sisters and how they lived their lives as *contemplatives in action*, and a discussion period on the essential values of the healing ministry of Jesus using the Pastoral Letter on Health care written by the Canadian Conference of Catholic Bishops (February 11, 2005).

Last year I reported on a number of new initiatives undertaken by the Catholic Health Association of Canada. Now, I am pleased to report to you that those initiatives are well underway.

At the recent Board of Directors meeting (September 12 and 13 in Montreal), the Board approved a full revision of the *Health Ethics Guide*. Having assessed its adequacy, a panel of Canadian and International reviewers advises us that significant additions should be made to address many new developments in the ethics environment since 2000, when the current *Guide* was first published. I am pleased to report that our health ethics guide is widely consulted throughout the world, and even as it is now, it is deemed to be one of the most comprehensive and authoritative decision-making guides available anywhere. Due to the extensive amount of work expected to complete the task, a new *Guide* should be available within about two or three years.

We continue to advance our two mandates for “Advocacy” and “Catholic Governance”. In our operational plan for 2006 we committed to advocating for public policies that foster dignity of the human person in all stages of life, promoting justice and equity in the delivery of health care, and positioning Catholic health care through our values, organizational culture and historic achievements. Refer to our website for detailed progress reports on the many areas of advocacy in which we are engaged. For example, the CHAC is actively engaged in a number of federal government health reviews, including the use of common drugs, end of life care, and social determinants of health.

Member facilities also frequently consult the CHAC office on issues affecting them, such as St. Elizabeth’s Hospital in Humboldt. After each of our Board meetings, our office prepares “CHAC Board Highlights” and CHAC Advocacy bulletins, which I forward electronically to CHAS and institutional members. This is intended for your information and feedback regarding CHAC governance generally, and for my performance as your CHAS representative on the board.

In an ongoing strategic initiative to position Catholic health care as an essential component of our health system, the CHAC continues to place high importance on its website at www.chac.ca, on the Annual Conventions, on the Communities of Practice Workshops and, of course, on Advocacy. Sylvie Deliecourt is our new website manager. She will rely on our members to be engaged and interactive on the website. Your commitments of time, talent and attention will enable us to meet our mutual expectations regarding the national and provincial Catholic health associations.

Catholic Health Association of Canada (continued)

I wish to report briefly on the Catholic Leadership and Values Integration programs. You will recall that before its reorganization, CHAC was responsible for maintenance of these two essential elements of Catholic health. Since 2004, the programs became the joint responsibility of a Provincial Associations and Sponsors group, while CHAC plays a facilitation role. We expect that these programs will be offered under a national protocol in the near future.

May I remind all of you that the next CHAC Annual Convention is May 2-4, 2008 in Quebec City. We will celebrate four hundred years of Catholic health care in Canada. Plan to come. Learn about and experience the awesome contributions the Church has made to the public health system. It behooves us to understand our roots and legacy in health care so that we need not feel intimidated by certain threats to its continuation.

Finally, I wish to report that the CHAC financial situation is stable. There are 3.75 person years in budget for four highly competent staff – President and CEO; Vice-President Ethics, Advocacy and Public Policy; Director, Events & Web/IT Development; Co-ordinator, Member Services and Administration. We are most blessed to have staff of this calibre.

Thank you for the wonderful opportunity to serve as your representative in the national Catholic health scene. I hope I am serving you well, and I continue to be most receptive to your support and assistance to do things better.
