

# President and Executive Director Report

### FOLLOWING TRUE NORTH: Navigating Change as Faith-filled Caregivers

This year, our 75th year as an Association, began with change a change of location for the office, a change to our staffing structure, and continued changes to the landscape of healthcare around us as the province brought shape to its singular health authority, and a portion of our member facilities amalgamated as Emmanuel Health in response. Change



is stressful. Change brings opportunity. Change is constant. The chosen theme of our 75th conference served as a reminder that in the midst of change, we are people of faith, and we navigate change by following Christ as our 'True North.' We invite you to read about this year's work of the Association (from July 1, 2017 to June 30, 2018) as we have navigated this year of change, ever faithful to our mission to serve others with the healing ministry of Christ.

The **Bishop's BBQ celebration**, now in its sixth successive year, has become an anticipated gathering where the Bishops of Saskatchewan invite and host the boards and staff of both the Catholic Health Association of Saskatchewan and Emmanuel Care. Hosted by Chris Donald, Chair of the Catholic Health Association of Saskatchewan at his home in Saskatoon on July 21, 2017, this group gathered to enjoy an evening of fellowship, networking, and encouragement from the Bishops.

Continuing with the theme of celebration and commissioning, the 2017 fall season started with **Compassionate Healers Masses** being planned and

hosted in each Diocese. These gatherings are for the benefit and intentions of medical personnel, health care workers and administrators, parish nurses, men and women religious in health care ministry and ministry of care volunteers in parishes across the province. The Archdiocese of Regina hosted its Mass



on September 14th, at Christ the King Parish with Archbishop Don Bolen as the celebrant and homilist. The Prince Albert Diocese held its Mass on September 17th at St. Mark's Parish, where Bishop Albert Thévenot was the celebrant and homilist. The Saskatoon Diocese hosted its Mass on October 4th at St. Holy Spirit Parish with Bishop Bryan Bayda, as the celebrant and homilist.

CHAS celebrated its 74th year by gathering for its **Annual Convention and Meeting of the Assembly** in Regina, Saskatchewan on October 20-22, 2017 with the theme '*Ministering to God's Beloved: serving and learning from those who are vulnerable.*' This gathering would be the third joint convention bringing together those serving in both Catholic health care and Catholic education. Highlights of the conference include:

- Attendance of 120+ delegates to the convention
- Outstanding speakers, including: Anne Butler (*The Beauty of the Dancer: Embracing our Own Vulnerability; The Beauty of the Son: Embracing the Vulnerability of Others*), Dr. Josephine Lombardi (*Becoming Experts in Humanity: Understanding the Factors that Influence Human Behaviour and Limit Authentic Freedom; Mercy and Beyond: Understanding the Obstacles that Keep Us from Being Merciful Witnesses*)



- Plenary sessions were offered to all delegates to enlighten them to issues in both Catholic health and Catholic education. The Health Plenary session was offered by Dr. Hazel Markwell who spoke to issues surrounding physician-assisted suicide and euthanasia, and the Education Plenary was offered by Fr. Mark Miller who offered insights on the gospel mandate to love those on the margins.
- Our Annual Meeting was held over the lunch hour on Saturday, October 21, 2017
- This year's Awards Banquet included the presentation of an Honorary Membership to Bert Yakichuk of Regina; the 2017 Mission Award was presented to the Mont St. Joseph Team (Joan Byrne, Lorrie Kaglea, Shannon Meyers) of Prince Albert.
- Archbishop Don Bolen celebrated Mass to conclude our gathering.
- This year's centerpieces (ornamental cupcakes and baby toques) were created by residents of the L'Arche Home in Saskatoon and Patricia Hunchak of Saskatoon, with silent auction proceeds of \$1100+ going

towards Day Care programming in Regina Catholic Schools.

 As a conference give-away, every delegate received a digital pedometer.

Overall feedback from the conference was very positive, with participants describing the excellent content they heard, and commenting on the invaluable networking opportunity and encouragement they received.




The significant budget cuts sustained by the Association in 2016 required that staffing costs be reduced; regretfully, the position of the Mission Education Coordinator was eliminated. Following the Mass, and to close the conference, **a tribute, blessing, and tearful** 

farewell was offered to Sandy Normand, who served as our Mission Education Coordinator for more than six years. The Board of Directors and staff offered their deep gratitude to Sandy for her commitment and excellent work to enthuse mission to our members. Her work with the Witness to Mission Formation Experience, and many other initiatives, has certainly left its mark.

#### Witness to Mission (WTM): a mission formation experience began its

2017 fall session with a return to St. Joseph's Integrated Health Centre in Macklin, which was their second time hosting the program at this facility. From September 7<sup>th</sup> (beginning with Day One) until



November 23<sup>th</sup> (concluding with Day Five), ten participants journeyed in




this rich offering of experientially-based mission formation. Many thanks to Sandy Normand for serving this cohort in this mission formation experience.

With reduced staffing into the new year, Sandra Kary and Marissa Alarcon worked together to be complete the delivery of the WTM experience from January –

March 2018 to two separate cohorts. St. Paul's Hospital, Saskatoon, hosting the program for a second time, brought together a cohort of 13 individuals. Hosting a fourth cohort was Mont. St. Joseph's Home in Prince Albert with 10 participants.

Councils, which will provide a mechanism for meaningful participation in monitoring the mission of the facility, quality and safety performance, financial positioning, and community needs and engagement. During this transitioning year, Emmanuel Care CEO, Scott Irwin, met with Chris Donald, CHAS Chair, Therese Jelinski, CHAS Past-Chair, and Sandra Kary, CHAS ED, to keep the Association abreast of the over-arching transitions and progress of amalgamation in order for the Association to discern the potential ramifications for serving our member facilities.

A Focus Committee of the CHAS Board of Directors met to further reflect on these changes in the provincial environment and our institutional membership, and to consider any re-positioning that might be needed in response. Upon review of the existing bylaws of the Association (particularly as it pertained to overall mandate, institutional membership and other voting members), it was determined that any immediate changes would be too premature. This Focus Committee also reviewed the Vision, Mission and Values statements of the Association, recommending

updated statements to the full Board of Directors and the membership for approval (see page 16 for more information).

The provincial Catholic Connections Committee continues to gather in Regina, now meeting bi-annually in the fall and spring (December 1, 2017 and April 17, 2018). This committee comprises representatives from CHAS, Emmanuel Care, the Saskatchewan Catholic School Boards Association (SCSBA), Campion College, St. Thomas More College, provincial K of C and CWL, and Diocesan and Eparchy offices. Archbishop Don Bolen sits as the representative of the Bishops of



Saskatchewan. Bert Yakichuk continues to serve as the Committee Chair.

In their final meeting minutes, dated January 31, 2018, members of Spiritual Care Saskatchewan recorded their decision and process towards the dissolution of their organization due to lack of membership and the current hospital chaplaincy and spiritual care situation in Saskatchewan. They invited CHAS to receive and steward the remaining funds from their organization to be used to support spiritual care and/or hospice palliative care.

At the national level, Sandra Kary, CHAS ED, served as the Chair of the biannually held **Provincial Associations** meetings, held in conjunction with the quarterly meetings of the Governing Council of the Catholic Health Alliance of Canada. In her role as Chair, Sandra also served as the Associations' Representative (a voting member) on the CHAC Governing Council. Her term in this capacity concluded in May 2018, however, Sandra continued to serve on CHAC's National Conference Steering Committee, and the Vulnerable Populations Task Group.

## Anne Reddekopp Treasurer's Report

I would like to thank the many donors, volunteers and supporters for their contributions which allow us to continue the mission the Catholic Health Association-to provide in collaboration with membership; leadership, education and resources in ethics, mission, spiritual care and social justice. Thank you for your commitment to our association.

In reference to the Independent Auditors' Report, I would like to note their opinion statement:

"In our opinion, these financial statements present fairly, in all material respects, the financial position of the Association as at June 30, 2018 and the results of its operations and the changes in its financial position for the year then ended in accordance with Canadian accounting standards for not-for-profit organizations."

The Balance Sheet shows a decrease in Assets to \$751,303 from the previous year balance of \$770,997. This is in part due to a redemption in our long term investments to meet operating expenditures.

The Statement of Revenue and Expenditures shows a deficiency of revenue over expenditures of \$27,928, which has been reduced from the previous year deficit of \$46,629. This is due to an aggressive cost cutting process. As of 2018 we no longer receive government funding. We continue to monitor our financial situation and make adjustments to our budget as required.

A special thank you to the CHAS staff: Sandra Kary our Executive Director, Mary Deutscher our Ethicist, and Marissa Alarcon our Interim Executive Director. I would like to recognize their dedication and professionalism.

#### CATHOLIC HEALTH ASSOCIATION OF SASKATCHEWAN NOTES TO THE FINANCIAL STATEMENTS June 30, 2018

Catholic Health Association of Saskatchewan (the "Association") was incorporated under the Saskatchewan Non-Profit Corporations Act on May 27, 1943. The mission of the Association is to offer leadership, education and resources in ethics, mission, spiritual care and social justice. Given its not for profit status, the Association is not subject to income taxes.

#### 1. SUMMARY OF SIGNIFICANT ACCOUNTING POLICIES

The accounting policies of the Association are in accordance with Canadian accounting standards for not-for-profit organizations applied on a basis consistent with the prior year. Outlined below are those policies considered particularly significant.

#### Accounts receivable

Accounts receivable are shown net of allowance for doubtful accounts, if any.

#### Fund accounting

The Association follows the restricted fund method of accounting. The operating fund accounts for the Association's programs and administration. Restricted funds have been established as follows:

Hon. Emmett M. Hall Fund:

The Hon. Emmett M. Hall fund was established for specific education projects in honour of the late Hon. Emmett M. Hall. The fund balance consists of an appropriation of surplus plus specific donations and interest earned on the fund balance less specific expenses.

Moola Freer Scholarship Fund:

The Moola Freer Scholarship Fund was established for Palliative Care education and awards by Dr. Dawood and Anne Moola. The fund consists of specific donations and interest earned on the fund balance less specific expenses.

#### Ethics Fund:

The Ethics Fund was established for the purpose of promoting and providing ethics education, resources and services. The fund was established from the sale of Advance Care Directive booklets and videos, and further enhanced with specific donations. The fund consists of specific donations, income from sales and interest earned on the fund balance less specific expenses.

#### Investments

Investments are recorded at fair market value.

#### Tangible capital assets

The Association records its capital assets at cost. The Association amortizes its capital assets based on estimates of the useful life of these assets. Amortization is provided on the straight line basis. The Association recognizes donated capital assets at their net realizable value.

#### 1. SUMMARY OF SIGNIFICANT ACCOUNTING POLICIES (CONT'D)

#### **Revenue Recognition**

The Association follows the restricted fund method of accounting for contributions. Restricted contributions for which a corresponding restricted fund is presented is recognized as revenue of that fund in the period received. Restricted contributions for which no corresponding restricted fund is presented is recognized in the general fund in accordance with the deferral method of accounting. Restricted contributions for expenses of one or more future periods is deferred and recognized as revenue in the same period as the related expenses are recognized. Unrestricted contributions are recognized as revenue when received or receivable if the amount can be reasonably estimated and collection is reasonably assured.

#### 3. INVESTMENTS

The Association has two mutual fund accounts. The fair market values at June 30, 2018 for the mortgage backed security funds was \$269,596 (June 30, 2017 - \$293,566) and the managed portfolio corporate class fund was \$371,841 (June 30, 2017 - \$368,349). Mortgage backed securities are not subject to credit risk and the corporate class fund bears a low risk rating.

The Association has a GIC which pays interest annually at 1.10%. The amount of the GIC is \$1,177 as at June 30, 2018 (June 30, 2017 - \$1,164). The GIC will mature January, 2021. Credit risk is not considered to be material since this is invested with a Saskatchewan Credit Union.

The Association paid rent for July and August 2017. Effective September 1, 2017, the Association has entered into an agreement where they will occupy space rent free.

#### 7. PROJECT CONTRIBUTIONS AND EXPENSES

The Association serves alongside a variety of provincial stakeholders on the ad-hoc Bishop's Advisory Group on Euthanasia and Physician-Assisted Suicide, and particularly on its Communications and Education sub-committee which is tasked to bring forth messaging and information on this very significant and all-encompassing issue. The Association received \$5,000 from the K of C in fiscal 2016 which was for the development of resources to inform our Catholic audiences of a pastoral response in light of those who might consider physician-assisted suicide as an option. In total the Association has spend \$7,610 towards this project with \$2,923 in expenditures incurred in the current year.
