HEYNOTE SPEAKERS



DR. SHANE SINCLAIR

Dr. Shane Sinclair is an Associate Professor and Cancer Care Research Professor with the University of Calgary, Faculty of Nursing and an Adjunct Associate Professor in the Department of Oncology, Cumming School of Medicine at the University of

Calgary. His research focuses on psychosocial and spiritual issues within oncology and palliative care, including his nationally funded program of research on compassion—with his recent study on Sympathy, Empathy and Compassion being awarded 'Paper of the Year,' by Palliative Medicine the worlds premiere palliative care journal.

COMPASSION is in the Eye of the Beholder

Compassion is a central principle of quality care—but what is compassion really and according to whom? Patients and healthcare providers are at the epicenter of compassionate care, yet their perspectives and experiences of compassion have historically been overlooked. In this presentation, the voice of patients and healthcare providers will be woven together and illustrated in the Compassion Model--containing the key ingredients of compassion.

DON'T BELIEVE EVERYTHING YOU SEE Challenges to Compassion

Compassion is one of the most liberally used terms in healthcare but how does it differ from routine care, sympathy and empathy? Distinguishing between these terms and critically appraising commonly cited barriers of compassion is important to not only the wellbeing of healthcare providers but ultimately the patients in their care. This presentation will carefully challenge commonly held beliefs, distinguish between terms in the lexicon of care, and delineate fact from fiction from an evidence-based perspective in order to help healthcare providers to perform at their full scope of compassion.



DR. DEBRA PARKER-OLIVER

Debra Parker Oliver is a nationally known researcher on Hospice Caregiving and a Professor at the University of Missouri. Despite her professional credentials, she found herself ill-prepared to face her husband's illness and death.

CAREGIVING A Journey to Redefine Hope Through Mission

Debbie Oliver will share her journey as a caregiver for her husband David. Emerging from their experience of his diagnosis, cancer treatment, death and dying, they pursue a mission to educate others about the ups and downs of facing and encountering death. They make 28 YouTube videos to accomplish this mission and in the process learn to find hope and conquer fear. Their mission continues to help Debbie redefine hope in a new life without David.

Daniel Lussier is CEO of the Catholic Health Corporation of Manitoba (CHCM), which was created by the Grey Nuns in 2000 and sponsors 15 health and human service agencies

providing compassionate care and support to Manitoban. He is currently a director and member of the Executive Committee of the Société de la francophonie manitobaine, ex-officio director of St. Boniface Hospital and director and board Chair of Invéstissement immobilier CCSM Ltée, a private-for-profit corporation offering seniors housing and health care services in Montreal, Québec.

COMPASSION RISING Mission in the Middle of the Mess

It is easy to be compassionate when we have had enough sleep, when only one patient or resident needs us at a time, when no one calls in sick, and all is right with the world. But what happens when we are short-staffed and over-capacity, tired and hungry, or when our worlds seem to be caving in? In 2017, Leah and her family experienced a miscarriage, a job loss, and her sister's tragic death. All the grief confirmed what she had suspected all along: our mission matters most in the mess, when we need to rely on something bigger than us to help us to rise to compassion and grace—at home and at work.
