Guidelines and Information for Scholarship

Scholarship funds are made available to persons who have registered or are planning to register in a Palliative Care home study or certificate program.

Grants are made for programs which have a direct application to palliative care.

Funds are designated for tuition and texts associated with the specified program.

Requests are not considered on a continuing or ongoing basis.

The fund is administered by a Committee of the Board of Directors. Ordinarily funds will be allocated on an annual basis.

The number of scholarships awarded in any year is based on the approved criteria and in relation to available funds.

Submission should be made in writing to the Fund by using the **Scholarship Application Form** provided. Please include any other pertinent material the applicant feels will help in the evaluation of the application.

The applicant will be advised in writing of the decision of the committee.

Applications received up to June 30 will be considered in the current year.
